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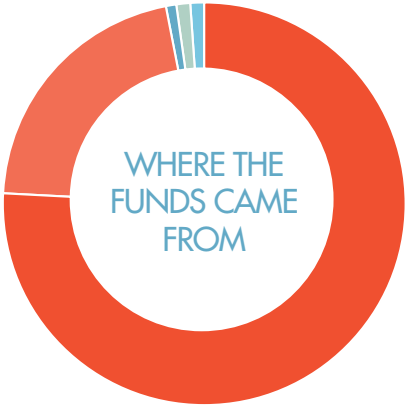

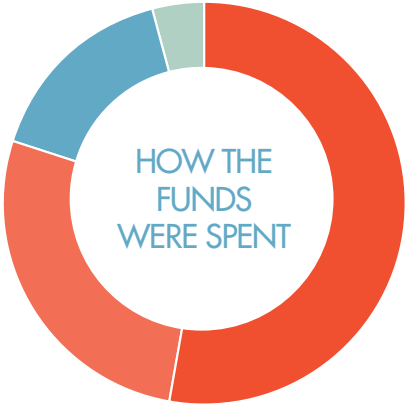

To contribute to NTI's work improving security around weapons-usable nuclear materials and building a global system to ensure that all countries have effective security in place.

THE VISION AND STEPS

To support work to advance the agenda of working toward a world without nuclear weapons and the urgent, practical steps to get there.

To expand the Asia Pacific Leadership Network (APLN) by engaging in regional outreach, developing partners, commissioning policy papers and conducting a series of strategic meetings on nonproliferation and nuclear security with regional leaders. **\$250,000**

European Leadership Network (ELN)

To expand ELN's geographical reach, political influence and relationship depth across Europe by developing partnerships with security and defense institutes; to support a NATO-Russia task force and UK-French Leadership Group to increase collaboration on nuclear and related issues. **\$250,000**

Institute of Peace and Conflict Studies

To promote debate on nuclear security issues within India, including facilitating high-level discussions in New Delhi, conducting research and promoting online debate. **\$32,200**

To support a Young Scholars Nuclear Workshop and three fellows. **\$48,300**

Latvian Institute of International Affairs

To co-host with NTI and ELN a regional experts seminar to discuss security issues in the wider Baltic Sea region, in particular the situation in Ukraine, its impact on shared concerns and how to avoid further destabilization of the region. **\$52,565**

Regional Centre for Strategic Studies

To hold a 10-day intensive workshop in Sri Lanka with young scholars and experts from India, Pakistan, China and the United States to discuss nuclear disarmament, safety and security issues. **\$40,000**
