

## Russia's BW Delivery Systems During the Soviet Program (1973-1992)

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DELIVERY SYSTEM	METHOD OF DISSEMINATION
Spray-tanks attached to delivery vehicles, such as Ilyushin bombers [1]	Line source aerosol dissemination
Aerial cluster bombs carrying specialized bomblets delivered by bombers [2]	Point source aerosol dissemination
Single and multiple-warhead intercontinental ballistic missiles [3]	Point source aerosol dissemination
Cruise missiles containing BW canisters [4] (Unknown whether or not this system was operationalized)	Point source/multiple point source aerosol dissemination
Insect vectors for use in anti-agricultural biological warfare [5]	Live insect vectors
